Shiramizu Amidado IIIvmination





From November 8 to 16, spectators gathered at the Shiramizu Amidado grounds to view the temple and the autumn foliage of the surrounding garden illuminated in the evening. Shiramizu Amidado is one spot in Iwaki renowned for its autumn colours, which looked particularly vivid lit up at night and reflected upon the surface of the pond. Stalls selling food and drink were also set up near the temple during the illumination.

The elegant temple in Uchigo was built in 1160. Enshrined within the temple are five Buddhist statues, all of which are from the Heian Period (794–1185) and are designated as National Important Cultural Properties. Shiramizu Amidado is the only building in Fukushima Prefecture to be designated as a National Treasure.

The beautiful garden and large pond surrounding the temple feature various sights that can be enjoyed with the changing seasons. As well as the rich palate of colours on display in the autumn, you can see white swans and snow in the winter, cherry blossoms in the spring and lotus flowers in the summer.

Information from the City Government Taking Care of Yourself this Influenza Season

We have now entered the time of year when outbreaks of influenza are common. Let's be sure to take measures to prevent the spread of the virus.

Three General Rules for Prevention

1 Cut off the Route of Infection

- After you have been outside, be sure to gargle and **wash your hands** with soap. Also wash your face and glasses.
- When someone near you is coughing, or you are in crowded areas such as a hospital or on the train, apply a mask so that it leaves no gaps and take extra care to gargle and wash your hands.
- · Regularly **ventilate** the room to reduce the risk of virus-containing droplets floating through the air.
- During epidemic periods, avoid crowds and activities where people congregate.

2 Build Up Resistance

- · Eat well balanced meals, three times a day.
- · Regulate one's daily life and get plenty of sleep.
- · Avoid wearing excessively thick clothing and perform moderate amounts of physical exercise.

3 Isolation from the Virus

- In rooms with an infected person, be sure to ventilate the air frequently. Use separate eating utensils.
- If you get sick, wear a **mask** and avoid going outside so that it does not spread to others.

Vaccinations

Taking a vaccine before the virus becomes prevalent is one effective method and it may prevent compilations or serious illness even if you do get sick. Consult with your doctor to learn more.

If You Get Influenza...

- See a doctor when symptoms (fever, fatigue, coughing or painful throat, muscle pain etc.) first appear. Wear a mask when you go to see the doctor.
- Be sure to take lots of fluids as it is easy to get dehydrated from a high fever.
- · Get plenty of sleep and allow yourself to rest in bed.
- Eat nutritious foods (with vitamins and proteins etc.) that can be digested easily.
- · Maintain moderate humidity indoors.

N.B. When you are experiencing coughing, practice **Cough Etiquette** (see below).

If you are about to cough or sneeze, cover your mouth and nose with a handkerchief or tissue. After that, wash your hands properly. If you are experiencing continual coughing, wear a mask.

*When using medicine at home for treatment, parents or guardians should not leave underage children alone and should watch out for abnormal behaviour for a few days.

As for schools etc. wait until two days have passed since the fever resolves and five days have passed since symptoms first developed before returning to school.

Cough Etiquette – When you are coughing/sneezing:

- 1. First, cover your mouth and nose with a tissue. (Dispose of used tissues in the bin.)
- 2. Wear a mask as much as possible.
- 3. When covering a cough or sneeze with your hands, clean your hands afterwards. (When you do not have access to a place to wash them, use hand antiseptics/sanitizing wipes.)
- 4. When you are feeling under the weather, see your doctor early.

The Rikusho (六書) system for classifying Kanji sorts them into six categories based on how they are formed. Learning about the different ways kanji are formed can help to build an association between a character's form and meaning (and in some cases, reading too). It is often easier to learn and remember a character by considering how its form relates to its meaning, rather than simply trying to commit to memory each character as a seemingly arbitrary visual symbol.

When learning about the rikusho, keep in mind that some characters may fit into more than one category. Moreover, the last two categories relate more to how new meanings have evolved over time, rather than how a character was originally formed. There are relatively few characters in either of the last two categories. These categories are only included here for the sake of completion. The six categories are described below with examples.

Pictographs (象形文字)

Characters based on rough drawings of what they represent are called pictographs. Many of the kanji that students of Japanese learn early on are pictographs, such as 目 "eye", 口 "mouth", 女 "woman", 母 "mother", 人 "person", 山 "mountain", 目 "sun" and 木 "tree". Learning such characters as pictographs can make them easier to remember. A few of these characters have been stylised to such an extent that they no longer resemble drawings.

Simple Ideographs (指事文字)

These characters express abstract concepts through an icon. The characters - "one", \pm "two" and \pm "three" are good examples. The characters \pm "above" and \top "below" are also clearly iconic representations of their meanings.

Compound Ideographs (会意文字)

These are formed through combining two or more existing kanji, where the new character's meaning is derived from the meanings of its components. For example, two trees (木) combine to give 林 "grove", and three combine to give 森 "forest". One example often given in introductory textbooks is the character 家 "home/family", formed by combining the components 宀 and \overline{x} (representing a house and a pig respectively). This character reflects a time in China where domesticated pigs were kept inside the home.

Phono-semantic Compound Characters (形声文字)

The vast majority of kanji fall into this category. These are typically made of two components: one indicating a broad meaning (意符), and the other a rough indication of pronunciation (音符). The pronunciation component relates to the character's original Chinese pronunciation and only sometimes indicates a kanji's on-reading (and never its kun-reading). Phonetic components can be used as excellent memory aids. For example, 拍 "clap", 舶 "ship", 泊 "overnight stay", 迫 "urge" and 伯 "chief" all have the on-reading of ハク, which is indicated by the 白 phonetic component (the character 白 "white" also has the on-reading ハク, but is not a phono-semantic compound). Another example can be seen in the characters 抱 "embrace", 砲 "cannon", 泡 "bubbles", 胞 "placenta" and 飽 "sated", which all have the on-reading of ホウ, and all contain the 包 phonetic component (again the character 包 "wrap" shares the ホウ on-reading but is of a different category). Keeping an eye out for phonetic components when you study will make learning on-readings much easier. Also, the more kanji you learn, the more you will be able to recognise these sorts of patterns. Be aware, however, that there are plenty of exceptions - you can easily learn these as such as you progress.

Phonetic Loan Characters (仮借文字)


These characters were "borrowed" for their phonetic value to write homophones or similar sounding words (in Chinese) that had no existing character. Often the new meaning became the standard and a new character would be coined to represent the old meaning. For example, the character $\rlap{1}{4}$ "north" was originally a pictograph of two people facing their backs to each other and meant "back" (the body part). The character was borrowed for its phonetic value to write "north" as well. Eventually a new character (背) was created to be used to distinguish "back" (背) from "north" (北).

Derivative Characters (転注文字)

This category is the vaguest of the lot. While there is no widely accepted definition, it generally refers to characters that have been given a new meaning. However, the relationship between the new meaning and the character's phonetic value is disputed. One example is the character 長 "length", which may also mean "head/elder". This character is pronounced differently in Chinese depending on which meaning it refers to.

Importantly, don't stress over these categories! Learn what is useful to you and don't let yourself get bogged down in the details. Knowing about the ways kanji are formed can help you to identify patterns and remember characters. If you are interested, there are also plenty of good books out there that give etymologies, which you may find helpful in your studies.
