Iwa-Key is Changing!

We're excited to announce some upcoming changes to Iwa-Key's internet presence!

For starters, the current "Iwa-Key" Facebook will be renamed to *Iwaki Vision*. Residents may already be familiar with the physical version of Iwaki Vision, which is published roughly 2-4 times a year, showcasing highlights of life in Iwaki. Although *Iwaki Vision's* Facebook will likely have a post rate of closer to 2-4 times a week, it will cover the same topics as the physical copy, showcasing some of the cool places and events that one can enjoy in our quirky city.

To make these snippets of life in Iwaki accessible to a larger audience, we will also be organizing a corresponding Instagram, featuring the same photo contents.



We hope that these changes will help better keep residents informed about community events as they arise, rather than as a once-monthly bulletin. Further, we hope that this will create a venue for residents to share their own Iwaki photos and experiences. Part of this will involve reviving a digital version of the "Cheese Iwaki" photo contest, where Iwaki's resident photographers can showcase some of their proudest work.

Physical copies of Iwaki Vision will still be compiled 2-4 times a year, as sort of a "best of" of our web content. As for Iwa-Key, physical copies will still be delivered until December, but as of January next year, they will be replaced by a more simplified event list. Important announcements regarding disaster relief and lifestyle tips will mainly be posted on the Iwaki International Association's Facebook page (https://facebook.com/IwakiIA/) and then shared through Iwaki-Vision's Facebook page, rather than directly uploaded.

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Top Leaf-Viewing Destinations



When it comes to Japanese nature-related activities, the viewing of autumn leaves (koyo) comes second only to cherry blossoms in terms of popularity. Iwaki is gifted with several great spots to enjoy koyo - perhaps the foremost being the Natsuigawa Valley.

The valley, which the JR Ban-Etsu East Line runs through, offers spectacular autumn views the likes of which you'd see in a *nihon-ga* painting. Throughout the length of the valley one can experience lush foliage, crisp air, and the flowing of the river in the background. Any station along the Ban-Etsu East line offers a beautiful area to get out and explore, though Eda Station is perhaps the highest-recommended by locals.

Though its nearby hiking trail was made inaccessible past the first waterfall by last year's typhoon, the walk along the main road of the valley remains tranquil and scenic. The area offers some modest amenities – a soba restaurant, a campground, a small store, and a square where local farmers will occasionally sell their produce. Nonetheless, it would be wise to bring some food and drinks, as business hours in the middle of a valley can be unpredictable.



For those who prefer less of a hike, the annual autumn illuminations at Shiramizu Amidado temple will be held from November 7th-15th, this year featuring projection mapping for the first time, as well as entry into the temple itself. Admission is 500 yen for adults, 300 yen for children Elementary school age, free for younger. Free shuttle buses will be available from Iwaki Station and Yumoto station on Saturdays and Sundays.
