Olympic "Flame of Recovery" Display in Iwaki



With the Tokyo 2020 Olympics being designated as the "Reconstruction Games", this year's torch relay included a special Flame of Recovery display in each of the three prefectures that were the most affected by the 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake (Iwate, Miyagi and Fukushima Prefectures). Held in each prefecture for two days, the special torch display concluded in Aquamarine Park on 25 March 2020. Although the event was forced to be scaled down, about 3600 people still came to see this historical event and pray for the ongoing revitalisation of Iwaki and the rest of Fukushima.



Iwaki was scheduled to be one of the first places that the Olympic torch would pass through on the following day. However, the relay was unfortunately cancelled in light of the announcement that the Olympics would be postponed. Despite this, Iwaki was fortunate to get a small taste of the excitement that Tokyo 2020 hopes to provide when the Olympics finally kick off next year.
